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I, Thomas Robertson, declare:

- I submit this declaration in support of Plaintiffs' Unopposed Motion for Final Approval of Class Action Settlement and Request for Award of Attorneys' Fees, Costs, Expenses, and Service Award. The following facts are within my personal knowledge, and if called as a witness, I could and would testify competently to them.
- 2. My law practice has two primary areas of focus. First, in the trial courts, I litigate civil rights cases with an emphasis on excessive force by police agencies and misconduct by correctional officers inside the jails and prisons. Second, I have an appellate law practice that encompasses civil and criminal appeals in both federal and state courts.
- My law firm, along with our co-counsel, conducted significant work related to this Action. This work includes, but is not limited to, significant pre-suit investigation, legal research needed for drafting the initial complaint, and defending Plaintiffs' depositions.
- 4. My firm prosecuted this Action on a contingent-fee basis with no guarantee of recovery. The risk, from the outset of this litigation, is that I would provide legal representation (along with co-counsel) with the understanding that we would not receive any compensation unless we were successful, and the Court approved the corresponding compensation.
- 5. My work covered many aspects of the Action. For example, in the first year, I visited the Facility seventeen times to conduct over twenty interviews of disabled detainees regarding the conditions of their confinement. Many of these interviews also pertained to evaluating potential Class Representatives for the Action. In addition, during the same time period, I drafted approximately forty letters to detainees to obtain more information between my visits. My other work on the case include extensive legal research to support the legal theories set forth in the Action's original Complaint; obtaining and reviewing the Facility's medical records for several of the potential class members; helping draft multiple rounds of written discovery; maintaining contact with numerous class members after they left the Facility; conducting valuation research in advance of the mediations and helping draft the mediation briefs; helping prepare the Class Representatives for their depositions and defending their depositions; and assisting in drafting and reviewing the papers filed in support of preliminary and final approval of this class action Settlement. I believe

the time I spent on this Action was reasonable and necessary considering the amount of work accomplished and the outcome we achieved.

- 6. The information regarding the time I spent on this case is taken from time records prepared and maintained by the firm in the ordinary course of business. I prepared the time records daily and, in most instances, the time was recorded immediately after the work was performed. In instances where I was away from my computer, such as during some visits to the Facility, I recorded the time upon my return to the office later the same day.
- 7. The schedule below provides the number of hours I have spent on this Action (as of August 15, 2023), my hourly billing rate, and the resulting lodestar calculation. My background and qualifications are set forth in Exhibit A to this declaration.

Attorney Thomas E. Robertson

Mr. Robertson founded the Law Office of Thomas E. Robertson with a focus on appellate law and civil rights litigation. He is admitted to practice in the state of California, as well as the U. S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit, and the U.S. District Court for the Central and Southern Districts of California. Mr. Robertson obtained his Juris Doctor degree from William & Mary Law School in Virginia, where he served on the Law Review, was awarded the school's highest award for oral advocacy, and graduated ranked 2nd in the Class of 2008.

After law school, beginning in September 2008, Mr. Robertson clerked one year for the Honorable Tommy E. Miller, a Magistrate Judge in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia. The following year, he moved to San Diego and clerked one year for Magistrate Judge Louisa S. Porter in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of California.

After concluding his federal judicial clerkships, Mr. Robertson opened the Law Office of Thomas E. Robertson and began representing plaintiffs in civil rights litigation. Specifically, Mr. Robertson focuses on cases of excessive force by law enforcement and unlawful practices inside jails and prisons. He has tried seven jury trials to verdict, including Wilkerson v. City of San Diego, 12-cy-2994-WQH (S.D. Cal.) (unanimous verdict in favor of plaintiff on claims of excessive force, including award of punitive damages); Johnson v. County of San Diego, 14-cv-616-LAB (S.D. Cal.) (unanimous verdict in favor of plaintiff on claims of false arrest and excessive force); and Sialoi v. City of San Diego, 11cv2280-JLS (S.D. Cal.) (unanimous verdict in favor of plaintiff on claims of negligence and officers' unconstitutional entry of the home). He has also prevailed on an *affirmative* motion for summary adjudication, where the district court found liability on plaintiffs' civil rights claims as a matter of law. Bush v. County of San Diego, 15-cv-686-L-JMA (S.D. Cal.). In addition, Mr. Robertson has recently obtained favorable settlements in "jail death" cases where liability was heavily disputed. See, e.g., Estrada v. Imperial County, 17cv326-BAS (S.D. Cal.) (\$675,000 settlement where young woman without any documented history of suicidal intent committed suicide in her cell); Woodward v. County of San Diego, 17cv2369-TWR (S.D. Cal.) (\$400,000 settlement for man unexpectedly assaulted and strangled by his cellmate).

Mr. Robertson's appellate practice began when he joined the panel of Appellate Defenders, Inc., representing indigent defendants on direct appeal of their criminal convictions. He was promoted up the tiers of panel to the highest level, now representing clients who received sentences of "life" or "life without the possibility of parole." Mr. Robertson has obtained full reversals in numerous cases, including recent decisions in *People v. Dominguez* (2021) 66 Cal.App.5th 163, and

People v. Cauble (Cal. App. Dec. 23, 2020) (Case No. D076215). He also won a unanimous decision in the California Supreme Court that resolved a split in authority on an issue of criminal restitution. (*People v. Martinez* (2017) 2 Cal.5th 1093.)

Mr. Robertson serves on the Southern District of California's pro bono panel (for civil lawsuits brought by indigent prisoners), and he received the "Outstanding Service Award" from the Legal Aid Society of San Diego for helping develop and implement the "Self-Help Workshop" for pro se litigants in the Fourth District California Court of Appeal. Mr. Robertson also gives CLE presentations, such as his recent program, "Building a Reply Brief from the Ground Up," presented to Appellate Defenders, Inc. (May 18, 2022), and to the Marin Chapter of the California Appellate Defense Counsel (Oct. 14, 2022). Mr. Robertson was selected as a "San Diego Super Lawyers Rising Star" in 2019, and then as a "San Diego Super Lawyer" from 2020 to present.

Before law school, Mr. Robertson graduated from Claremont McKenna College with a degree in Mathematics and Economics, worked two years for the Mergers & Acquisitions Department of Goldman Sachs, then moved to Chile to teach high school mathematics.
